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Introduction

In 2025, EDF Group continued to strengthen its role as a leading advocate for a decarbonized, resilient and sovereign European energy system. In a context marked by geopolitical instability, acceleration in climate extreme events and renewed attention to industrial competitiveness, EDF's climate advocacy focused on promoting electrification, long-term energy sovereignty and the deployment of low-carbon infrastructure as key enablers of the just transition in the territories where the Group operates.

As EDF celebrates its 80th anniversary in 2026, the Group reaffirms the relevance of its integrated model and its long-standing contribution to the public interest through reliable, affordable and low-carbon electricity generation. To mark this milestone, EDF announced a €240 million program dedicated to accelerating electrification in France, supporting low income households through subsidized heat pump installation, SME through access to electrified trucks and charging stations, and industrial actors through competitive access to "ready to plug" land, allowing them to transition away from fossil fuels. As part of this momentum, the Group also announced a series of commercial offers and partnerships aimed at concretely accelerating the electrification of end uses—targeting households, social housing providers, businesses and industrial players—by combining price incentives, support for equipment (heat pumps, charging stations), financing solutions and technical assistance to promote the shift away from fossil fuels. Through those initiatives, EDF highlights the central role of electrification in strengthening both climate action and European energy sovereignty, while supporting competitiveness and purchasing power.

EDF maintained one of the world's lowest carbon intensity for electricity generation, at 26.5gCO₂/kWh, reflecting an energy mix largely based on nuclear, hydropower and other renewable sources. This positioning underpins the Group's public advocacy for pragmatic and technology-neutral climate policies capable of delivering rapid and large-scale decarbonization.

This year also marked the deployment of EDF's renewed CSR architecture, aligned with the Group's strategic program "Ambitions 2035". Structured around three pillars: building the electricity system of tomorrow, operating within planetary boundaries and supporting a just transition, this framework strengthens the integration of sustainability considerations into EDF's strategy, operations and public engagement.

Recognizing that the success of the transition depends not only on environmental ambition but also on social acceptability, EDF published its third Report on Just Transition in 2025. This report highlights the Group's approach to supporting employees, customers, territories and stakeholders through the transformation of the energy system, while contributing to an inclusive and socially responsible transition. It also reinforces EDF's advocacy for climate policies that combine decarbonization objectives with social cohesion and economic fairness.

As climate-related risks intensify, EDF further advanced its Climate Adaptation Plan publishing for the first time the investments dedicated to adaptation between 2025 and 2040 amounting to c. 24bnEUR, including distribution networks. The Group also continued to mobilize sustainable finance instruments, notably through its Green Bond program which reached 21.3bnEUR, to support investments in low-carbon generation, electrification and climate resilience projects.

Against this backdrop, responsible climate advocacy remains a core component of EDF's governance framework. In a context of increasing scrutiny regarding corporate lobbying practices, EDF continued to operationalize its Responsible Advocacy Charter, ensuring alignment between its climate commitments, external positions and industry association memberships. Particular attention is paid to consistency with EDF's raison d'être, the Paris Agreement and the principles of a just transition.

Through its engagement with policymakers, industry stakeholders and civil society, EDF remains committed to promoting transparent, science-based and forward-looking climate and energy policies capable of supporting a fair, resilient and sovereign transition.

Executive summary

EDF's climate advocacy strategy is built on transparency, responsible engagement, and alignment with international climate goals. Through direct and indirect engagement, EDF aims to contribute to the development of effective climate policies while advancing its commitment to a sustainable, low-carbon future.

This report illustrates EDF's strong commitment to ensuring that its actions and those of the associations whom it is a member are aligned with the objectives of the Paris Agreement, its Raison d'être and its Just Transition principles.

This report has been prepared during the first quarter of 2026.

Key findings

Advocating for Ambitious Climate Policies

EDF engages directly with policymakers, industry associations, and stakeholders to influence climate-related policies. In 2025, EDF worked with European institutions, including the European Commission, Parliament, and Council, to influence positively key legislation related to climate and energy. EDF's climate advocacy strategy is grounded in scientific evidence, supporting carbon pricing mechanisms, acceleration in electrification, and the phase-out of coal-based electricity generation.

Industry Association Review

EDF collaborates with various industry associations to further its climate advocacy objectives. Recognizing the influence of these associations on climate policy, EDF conducts yearly evaluations to ensure alignment with the Paris Agreement and EDF's climate advocacy principles. This evaluation process triggers follow-up actions to address any misalignments.

The Group has selected 45 associations based on several factors: their influence on the energy sector, their relevance to climate change, their involvement in policy discussions at national and international levels, and their focus on climate-related public policies.

Overall, out of the 45 associations assessed, 17 are highly aligned with EDF's climate policy positions, 21 show medium to high alignment, 6 medium alignment, and 1 low to medium alignment. None of the associations were found to be completely misaligned.

Our approach on direct and indirect advocacy

EDF is committed to advocating for policies that advance climate action while considering societal needs and economic development. This commitment involves ongoing assessment of advocacy initiatives, conducted in collaboration with industry associations, to ensure consistency with EDF's principles of responsible climate advocacy.

Encouraging policymakers to prioritize robust climate action, EDF emphasizes the importance of implementing cohesive and integrated climate policies and regulatory frameworks. These measures are essential to facilitate a fair and timely transition that accounts for the diverse contexts in which EDF operates.

This engagement encompasses direct interactions with policymakers as well as indirect involvement through industry associations. Guided by established principles, EDF's advocacy efforts remain focused on promoting responsible and effective climate policies aligned with strategic objectives and reflecting the organization's stance on key climate change issues.

In its ongoing direct and indirect advocacy for climate policy, EDF remains dedicated to:

- Collaborating with policymakers and industry associations to promote its climate stance;
- Engaging in constructive dialogues and cooperation for a fair transition;
- Participating in coalitions and associations in line with the Paris Agreement objectives;
- Contributing constructively to policy discussions, respecting diverse viewpoints;
- Conducting regular reviews of industry associations and transparently disclosing results;
- Addressing any misalignments with our principles within industry associations;
- Incorporating global best practices into our advocacy and disclosures as needed;
- Respecting the principles of EDF Group Responsible Advocacy charter and following the rules of EDF's Code of Ethics and Compliance.

EDF is a registered interest representative as defined under the Sapin II Law, and as such, is listed in the French High Authority for Transparency in Public Life (HATVP)'s register of interest representatives. EDF also submits an annual declaration to the HATVP detailing its interest representation activities, i.e., any actions aimed at influencing a public decision carried out in relation to public officials identified by the legislator at the national level. EDF's subsidiaries such as RTE and Enedis, as well as Dalkia, are also registered individually, each declaring their lobbying activities carried out over the course of the year. The list of individuals involved in lobbying activities on behalf of EDF is regularly updated in the HATVP register.

Throughout 2025, the Group actively engaged with European institutions such as the Commission, Parliament, and Council to positively influence legislative proposals and decisions pertinent to the EU's Climate and Energy Policy Framework, as well as the Group's operations. EDF is dedicated to conducting these activities transparently and responsibly, as evidenced by its inclusion in the EU transparency register (n°39966101835-69) and adherence to its code of conduct (Annex 3 of the 2014 Interinstitutional Agreement) in interactions with EU Institutions. Furthermore, EDF's positions and responses to EU consultations are publicly available (also shared via social media platforms, including LinkedIn and X), along with a list of the main professional associations and think-tanks in which EDF participates. The company also adheres to applicable international conventions, refrains from seeking information or decisions through dishonest means or undue pressure, and provides EU representatives and stakeholders with comprehensive, accurate, and timely information.

In every country where it operates, EDF conducts advocacy activities tailored to local contexts while engaging stakeholders on decarbonization and energy transition issues. This approach mirrors its global advocacy strategy.

EDF climate-related policy and advocacy position

As the world's leading power producer with no direct CO₂ emissions¹, EDF has set itself the target of achieving Net Zero Emission by 2050. The Group has thus committed to a trajectory of reducing all its emissions (scope 1, 2 and 3) by 2030, 2035 and 2050, in line with a +1.5°C warming scenario as assessed by Moody's Net Zero Assessment.

EDF is one of the leading non-state actors in national and international discussions on climate change and promotes public policies that encourage actual carbon reduction in the economy.

Advocating for Ambitious Climate Policies

EDF is actively involved in advocating for ambitious climate policies across local, national, and international platforms. This includes backing initiatives such as carbon pricing, renewable energy incentives, and regulations focused on curbing emissions across various sectors of the economy. In its pledge to tackle climate change, EDF is committed to supporting and advancing:

Scientific position

EDF fully recognizes the scientific consensus established by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which has confirmed that climate change is unequivocally caused by human activities. EDF acknowledges the IPCC as the leading global authority on climate science and supports the urgent need to significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions and achieve net zero anthropogenic CO₂ emissions.

EDF's Paris Agreement-Aligned Climate Advocacy and Emissions Reduction Strategy

EDF aligns its advocacy activities with the goals of the Paris Agreement and works with institutions, industry bodies, NGOs, and academic stakeholders to promote effective climate policies. The Group supports regulatory frameworks that enable emissions reduction across energy production and end-use, including carbon pricing mechanisms that encourage cost-efficient decarbonization. EDF has set intermediate emissions reduction targets for 2030 and remains committed to achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions across all three scopes by 2050.

Carbon Pricing Climate Policies

Carbon pricing is a key pillar of EDF's climate advocacy. EDF supports robust and predictable carbon pricing mechanisms as an essential tool to incentivize low-carbon investment, foster innovation, and accelerate the transition to a competitive and sustainable low-carbon economy.

Development of low-carbon energy sources to achieve decarbonization and energy efficiency

EDF Group is committed to developing low-carbon energy solutions to support decarbonization and energy efficiency. As a leading producer of low-carbon electricity in Europe, EDF combines nuclear power with renewable energy sources, particularly hydropower, wind, and solar. The Group is progressively phasing out coal-fired generation and investing in future energy systems, including new nuclear capacity, renewable technologies, innovation programs, and customer solutions supporting electrification and energy efficiency.

EDF's Raison d'être & Just Transition Principles

EDF's advocacy is guided by its Raison d'être, adopted in 2020, which commits the Group to building a net zero energy future while preserving nature and supporting social and economic development. This commitment is grounded in just transition principles², ensuring that the energy transition is fair, inclusive, and aligned with the needs of all stakeholders.

Transparency and disclosure

Transparency and disclosure are crucial for EDF's climate advocacy because they promote accountability, build trust among stakeholders, facilitate engagement, and inspire broader action towards addressing climate change and transitioning to a sustainable future.

Internal oversight of climate policy engagement

The CEO holds the highest position responsible for Climate Change within the Group, reflecting EDF's commitment to ensuring decisive leadership in addressing climate-related issues.

As such, the CEO's climate responsibilities within the Board of Directors include conducting regular evaluations of climate change risks and opportunities, with Climate Change identified as a top priority risk for the Group. To enhance advisory capacity on climate matters, the CEO appointed two dedicated climate focal points within both the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee, the latter reporting directly to him.

Moreover, serving as the Head of the CSR Strategic Committee, the CEO steers the Group's CSR strategic division, overseeing major CSR challenges and opportunities. This role emphasizes the CEO's pivotal role in shaping EDF's approach to corporate social responsibility, including climate-related initiatives.

Operationally, the Impact Division at EDF leads the coordination of the company's global public policy stance on climate change. This unit collaborates closely with Country and Global Business Lines to develop thorough scenarios and position papers on climate policies, guiding EDF's advocacy efforts at national and local levels. EDF remains committed to aligning with the objectives of the Paris Agreement within the associations it collaborates with, emphasizing its dedication to advancing global climate action.

To ensure consistency in the positions promoted by the Group, EDF has established specific governance measures. It refrains from supporting initiatives that diverge from its goals in combating climate change, as demonstrated by its decision to exit Business Europe in November 2020. EDF's key positions on climate-related topics are validated by the Public Authorities Relations Management Committee, with the exception of those relating to regulated infrastructure managers as defined in the Energy Code. This committee, chaired by the director of public and international affairs, meets weekly and brings together the Group's Strategy Department, the Public Affairs Department, the European Affairs Department, the Regulation Department and the Legal Department.

Furthermore, EDF's management system for direct and indirect climate policy engagement is also overseen by dedicated units within the Group's subsidiaries, reflecting a comprehensive approach to climate advocacy throughout the organization.

All public policy engagement that EDF undertakes must adhere to its Code of ethics Principles and to EDF's Responsible Advocacy Charter.

The Group's positioning on the main climate policies

Carbon neutrality

Scientific Position & EDF's Paris Agreement-Aligned Climate Advocacy and Emissions Reduction Strategy

As part of its Paris Agreement-aligned climate advocacy and emissions-reduction strategy, EDF is working to accelerate France's energy transition and to end its dependence on fossil fuels.

EDF is notably a member of the French Electricity Union (UFE), which promotes a set of reforms to prepare the future of the energy system as it moves towards "Net Zero Emissions"³.

The Group is involved in the development of the French Energy and Climate Strategy (SFEC - Stratégie française sur l'énergie et le climat) launched in 2022 as France's roadmap to achieve carbon neutrality by 2050 and ensure society's adaptation to the impacts of climate change. EDF has submitted several stakeholder position papers emphasizing the urgent need to accelerate decarbonisation efforts in France and phase out fossil fuels: EDF's stakeholder position paper on the SFEC⁴, EDF's position paper on the Multi-Year Energy Programme and the National Low-Carbon Strategy⁵, EDF's position paper on the National Climate Change Adaptation Plan⁶.

EDF updates its Net Zero 2050 scenario in 2026⁷ which demonstrates that climate ambition, economic competitiveness and energy sovereignty can be reconciled at the European level. Bernard Fontana, CEO of EDF, was among the forty CEOs of major European companies across the energy, industry, finance and services sectors who signed a collective op-ed, published in *Les Echos* on 5 June 2025 at the initiative of *Entreprises pour l'Environnement* (EpE). It argues that Europe's ecological transition, underpinned by the Green Deal, conceived as Europe's concrete follow-up to the Paris Agreement, is not a constraint on competitiveness but a strategic asset for long-term prosperity, resilience and industrial sovereignty⁸.

Carbon Pricing and EU ETS Advocacy

Carbon Pricing Climate Policies

EDF consistently advocates for strong and predictable carbon pricing policies as a central pillar of Europe's climate ambition, industrial competitiveness and long-term investment framework.

EDF contributed significantly to discussions on the Fit for 55 package during the previous term of office (2019-2024), particularly on the establishment of a robust European greenhouse gas market and continues to contribute to the debates underway within the new European Commission since 2024. More specifically, the Group advocates an approach that preserves the climate ambition on the path to carbon neutrality by 2050, particularly via robust CO2 prices, while ensuring that the entire economy becomes more competitive and resilient, both in terms of energy generation and consumption.

In this regard, in March 2026, EDF joined over 100 other companies and investors across Europe in signing an open letter, coordinated by Cleantech for Europe, the We Mean Business Coalition, the Corporate Leaders Group Europe and the Business for CBAM Coalition, calling on EU leaders to maintain a strong and credible Emissions Trading System (ETS). It stresses that the ETS is a key driver of clean investment, innovation and reduced dependence on volatile fossil fuels and therefore essential for Europe's industrial competitiveness, investment certainty and decarbonization⁹.

Similarly, major European power companies, including EDF, addressed a joint letter to Commission President Ursula von der Leyen and European Council President António Costa, emphasizing that a ETS is a cornerstone for long-term investment and industrial decarbonization. The letter also highlights the importance of preserving the EU internal electricity market and marginal pricing (merit order) to ensure security of supply and affordability, ensuring stable and predictable regulation to unlock large-scale, long-term investments, and providing targeted support for industry without undermining well-functioning market mechanisms¹⁰.

Electrification of uses

Development of low-carbon energy sources to achieve decarbonization and energy efficiency

In the Fit for 55 debate, EDF promotes a coherent decarbonization pathway based on electrification and a diversified low-carbon energy mix. More specifically, the Group:

- encourages the electrification of uses, based on the observation that electrification is stagnating in Europe when it should be accelerating to meet climate and industrial objectives. EDF therefore calls for a strong political mobilization to reverse this trend, by setting up a European action plan for electrification with clear targets, monitoring indicators, and appropriate support mechanisms, including through non-discriminatory electricity taxation.
- ensure that a full range of low-carbon technologies contributes to an economically optimal decarbonization pathway, by supporting an energy mix based on controllable electricity assets – particularly nuclear and

hydroelectricity – alongside renewable energies, smart grids, and decarbonized gases – notably electrolytic hydrogen – for sectors that are difficult to electrify. These issues were further developed in the "Net Zero 2050" scenario that EDF presented to European public decision-makers, advocating a systemic vision of the energy system.

EDF is committed to supporting and accelerating the electrification of energy uses in France. To mark its 80th anniversary, EDF is investing €240 million to help low income consumers and industrial customers purchase heat pumps and electric trucks, and to support the reindustrialization of France through competitive low carbon electricity¹¹.

In line with its commitments, EDF participated in the call published on 16 March 2026 by the Corporate Leaders Group Europe (CLG) in support of electrification¹². The signatories notably call for a target to electrify 50% of final energy consumption across the EU by 2040 under the upcoming EU Action Plan on Electrification to be presented by the Commission on 19 March. The coalition also stresses the importance of regulatory stability, particularly regarding the EU ETS, as well as the need for direct EU-level funding to support electrification under the next EU budget.

Low-Carbon Energy Mix Strategy

Development of low-carbon energy sources to achieve decarbonization and energy efficiency

Since 2017, the EDF group has been engaged in the Powering Past Coal Alliance¹³, which promotes, in line with the Paris Agreement, the phasing out of coal by 2030 in EU countries and before 2050 worldwide. This coalition led to the creation of the Coal Transition Commission, co-chaired by France, and to the call issued by 25 countries to exclude any new coal-fired power plants from their nationally determined contributions to be updated under the Paris Agreement¹⁴.

Consistent with this, EDF supports the development of all low-carbon energies around the world. EDF supports the Global Renewable Alliance which calls for tripling renewable energy capacity and doubling the annual rate of improvement in energy efficiency worldwide by 2030¹⁵. EDF is a founding member of The Utilities for Net Zero Alliance (UNEZA), which was set up at COP28 in Dubai and whose secretariat is provided by the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA).

EDF has also committed to working toward tripling the global nuclear capacity by 2050 by signing the "Net Zero Nuclear Industry Pledge" in September 2023, an initiative endorsed by more than 20 countries in a formal declaration at COP28¹⁶, in the presence of EDF's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer.

At the World Nuclear Exhibition 2025 in Paris, EDF reaffirmed its ambition to play a driving role on the new nuclear market, concluding strategic cooperation agreements with major European industrial partners, supporting nuclear developments in France and on the export market, and the continued operation of its nuclear reactors¹⁷.

Advancing an inclusive transition

EDF's Raison d'être & Just Transition Principles

Ten years after the Paris Agreement, EDF continues to drive an energy transition that combines climate ambition with shared progress.

EDF supports the "1 Climate Pact"¹⁸ initiative, launched in 2023 by MEDEF and its partners AFEP, College of Sustainable Development Directors (Collège des Directeurs du développement durable - C3D), Business and Progress (Entreprises et Progrès), Companies for the environment (Entreprises pour l'Environnement - EpE) and the UN Global Compact - France Network. This initiative aims to highlight and promote the low carbon innovations, solutions, technologies, products and services developed by companies established in France to ensure a successful transition to a low-carbon economy.

Lastly, in November 2025 in Belém (Brazil), where the EDF group attended COP30, it notably highlighted innovative practices for the decarbonization of electricity systems in isolated territories such as French Guiana, illustrating its commitment to an inclusive energy transition.

It is also important to note that EDF is part of the Taskforce on Inequality and Social-related Financial Disclosures (TISFD), which aims to develop a global framework that helps companies and investors identify, measure, and disclose their impacts, risks, and opportunities related to social issues and inequalities¹⁹.

In 2025, EDF published its Just Transition Report²⁰, which provides a comprehensive overview of the Group's concrete actions and commitments to ensure that the energy transition is not only low-carbon but also socially inclusive, covering topics such as anticipating social impacts, supporting employees and territories, engaging stakeholders, and contributing to systemic change.

Summary view

In conclusion, EDF's Climate advocacy positions are well aligned with the Paris Agreement and its objective of limiting global warming to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels. Key principles, including the science-based position, EDF's Raison d'Être and Just Transition principles, the development of low-carbon energy sources, and energy efficiency, are central to EDF's strategy. As part of its commitment to transparency and disclosure, EDF publicly shares its positions and responses to consultations, along with a list of the main professional associations and think tanks in which it is involved.

Indirect climate policy engagement

Direct engagement isn't the sole avenue for businesses to influence policy. EDF, for instance, participates in about 45 industry associations, addressing various topics such as: greater climate ambition, carbon pricing, accelerating the deployment of renewable technologies, developing and upgrading infrastructure through smart grid technologies to support the energy transition, and electrification as a means for decarbonizing energy end-users. Recognizing the significant influence of industry associations on climate policy, EDF has consistently emphasized the need to align indirect climate advocacy efforts with the 1.5°C ambition of the Paris Agreement. This entails advocating within these associations to adjust their stances and enhance their involvement in climate-related initiatives.

For a number of years, EDF has initiated internal evaluations of its industry affiliations to gauge their active involvement on behalf of EDF, specifically in climate policy matters. But it has deemed critical to produce a public review which aims to offer a detailed exploration of EDF's primary industry associations and their contributions to climate-related initiatives.

Internal governance of industry associations

The assessment of EDF's advocacy efforts involves a review process that prompts necessary actions. This includes yearly evaluations of partner professional associations to ensure their alignment with EDF's Raison d'Être, the Paris Agreement's objectives of limiting global warming to 1.5°C, and the principles of a just transition.

Furthermore, EDF's Responsible Advocacy Charter and trade associations review methodology offer guidance to all entities. It mandates that during membership renewal, entities must verify with industry associations that their climate policy initiatives align with EDF's positions and the 1.5°C targets set by the Paris Agreement, *inter alia*.

The assessment was carried out internally within the Group and involved the collaboration of several corporate departments (Public Affairs, Regulation, International Affairs, CSR, R&D and Strategy), as well as different Global Business Units. From a process standpoint, each business unit reviews their associations and sends the data collected to the Impact Direction, which then draws up a report.

Industry association review

Selection process

This assessment focuses on 45 of EDF's industry associations, chosen from EDF's numerous associations membership worldwide, following an objective and rigorous process.

We prioritized the most pertinent associations based on several criteria:

- Their relevance to the energy sector;
- Their significance regarding climate change issues;
- Active engagement in policy dialogues or influence on climate-related public policies ;
- Their international or European reach, especially in regions where EDF operates extensively.

Associations primarily focused on non-climate-related matters were excluded from the review. Our focus is on associations whose engagement and perimeter are significant. However, we are committed to enhancing our selection methodology and broadening the scope of associations covered in the future.

Assessment methodology

Reviewal process

EDF monitors closely all engagement of its entities with trade associations and think tanks including their alignment with EDF's raison d'être. All advocacy activities are therefore conducted in line with the principles of the Just Transition²¹ as well as the goals of the Paris Agreement and EDF also monitors partner associations to align their actions with these. An annual review process is put in place which triggers – when needed – follow-up actions.

²¹ Just Transition being understood as enabling the energy transition towards net zero while leaving no one is left behind. It consists for instance in promoting green and decent jobs and workforce retention, reskilling and redeployment of workers when needed, social protection, social dialogue, and proper engagement with affected stakeholders at the local, national, and international level.

EDF identifies on a yearly basis, for each country and/or region of presence and/or interest the main associations involved in advocacy activities of climate policies and conducted, for each of them, a qualitative assessment (through interviews, documentary research and self-completed questionnaires) in order to identify the association's level of alignment with the Paris Agreement and the Just Transition principles. Each entity puts into question EDF's role in the association and the alignment of the latter with the Group's raison d'être. For subsidiaries whose shares are listed on regulated markets, or subject to the competence and power of financial market supervisory and regulatory authorities, the methodology is implemented while respecting and preserving the current organizational structures and governance.

This review took place between October 2025 and April 2026. Associations' policy positions and engagement that occurred after this time were, therefore, not included in this review.

This thorough methodology is crafted to maximize EDF's transparency and adheres to the recommendations set forth by the OECD, the UN PRI, and the Global Standard on responsible lobbying principles.

Assessment of alignment methodology

This assessment was carried out on the basis of six main dimensions:

- I- **Climate policy**: the extent to which the association supports the UNFCCC process, particularly the Paris Alignment, and other global policy initiatives;
- II- **Climate science**: the extent to which the association involves itself in the issues related to climate change and in the results and evidence of the Reports published by the IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change);
- III - **Carbon Pricing Climate Policies**: the extent to which the association supports Carbon Pricing (Carbon Tax, Emissions Trading System);
- IV - **Development of low-carbon energy sources to achieve decarbonization and energy efficiency**: the extent to which the association supports innovative and effective technologies in the fight against climate change;
- V -EDF's Raison d'être « build a net zero energy future with electricity and innovative solutions and services, to help save the planet and drive wellbeing and economic development” & Just Transition Principles: the extent to which the association meets EDF's main CSR principles;
- VI - **Transparency and disclosure**: the extent to which the association's disclosure is aligned with best-practice standards, such as the TCFD, GRI, SDGs and associated reporting criteria.



This qualitative assessment consists of analyzing published reports, statements, and policy positions related to climate change. To supplement EDF's online research, EDF also actively engages with associations to gain a deeper understanding of their commitment to addressing climate issues. Through this assessment, EDF determines how the company and industry associations are aligned with its responsible climate-related advocacy principles.

Rating system

The methodology developed by EDF to assess associations evaluates the six key dimensions listed above, each scored according to their level of alignment - **High, Medium, Low or Irrelevant**:

- **High**: Full commitment to EDF's principles.
- **Medium**: Evidence of progress and commitment towards EDF's principles.
- **Low**: Ambivalent or unclear statements regarding EDF's principles.
- **Irrelevant**: No significant activity, stance, or influence related to the criteria, thus excluded from evaluation.

1. Scoring Approach

Each dimension is assigned a point value as follows: Irrelevant = N/A; Low = 1 point; Medium = 2 points; High = 3 points. The points assigned to each relevant dimension are averaged to calculate the overall score. Dimensions rated as Irrelevant are not included in the averaging calculation.

2. Final Rating Based on Average Score

The final rating of the association's alignment is determined by the average score according to the following ranges:

Average Score Range	Final Rating
≥ 0 and < 0.75	Low
≥ 0.75 and < 1.5	Low/Medium
≥ 1.5 and < 2.25	Medium
≥ 2.25 and < 2.75	Medium/High
≥ 2.75	High

3. Priority of Dimension I (Climate Policy)

The climate policy dimension (Dimension I) is key for EDF. If the association is rated as Low on Dimension I, it is automatically considered fully misaligned with EDF's principles. In such cases, the final rating is set to "Low", regardless of the overall average score.

The assessment carried out by EDF is compared with evaluations from external stakeholders, particularly those published by InfluenceMap (LobbyMap Scores). In cases where EDF's assessment and external evaluations differ significantly, explanations are provided to clarify the reasons behind these discrepancies.

Addressing misalignment

In its assessment sheets, EDF highlights the efforts undertaken to **influence associations from within**, particularly when certain positions diverge from the Group's climate principles. Rather than opting for immediate disengagement, EDF prioritizes **constructive engagement** to promote greater alignment with the Paris Agreement.

The **specific actions undertaken in this regard are detailed in the appendix**, illustrating the Group's proactive stance in driving progress from the inside.

In cases where misalignment is identified (eg "low" score) between an association's position and EDF's climate commitments, the Group implements a structured and proportionate engagement process, consisting of the following key steps:

Step 1:

Where industry associations have unclear or misaligned positions, EDF offers guidance and support to help reach an aligned conclusion and agree on a way forward. Indeed, if a gap is detected between the principles of an association and what the Group promotes in its *raison d'être*, the goals of the Paris Agreement and the principles of Just Transition, EDF provides an analysis of the degree to which it can continue to promote its values whilst remaining a member of the association in question. Each entity/business line bears responsibility with the relevant associations. In such situations, EDF's approach is to initiate dialogue with the industry association to:

1. Clearly articulate the areas where their position differs from EDF's.
2. Analyze the reasons behind this misalignment.
3. Explore the potential for adjustments in their position and establish timelines for any changes.
4. Collaboratively develop specific recommendations for addressing the misalignment.
5. Regularly review the progress made on the agreed-upon actions.
6. This process is overseen by the business lead responsible for maintaining the ongoing relationship with the industry association.

Once this analysis has been completed, if it reveals material misalignments, EDF's position is to encourage the association in question to adopt a more proactive approach in terms of climate advocacy during a certain period of time. EDF firmly believes that it can be more effective in bringing about change from within, rather than from outside.

Step 2:

If, despite of the measures described in Step 1, the assessment of the level of alignment still results to be "low" for 1 consecutive year, then the issue will be brought to the attention of the top management of relevant entities, who will assess possible counteractions which may also include the decision for EDF to leave the association and/or considering joining new ones.

Summary table

This table shows details of how each of the 45 industry associations assessed were engaging on EDF's policy priorities during the in-scope time period (2025).

The main findings from the 2025 review of the most relevant associations, conducted using alignment assessment methodology outlined above, are presented below in the Appendix. For each association reviewed, the following information is provided: a brief description of the association and its engagement position; EDF's principal roles within the association; the main actions undertaken by the association and main regulatory texts on which the association has exerted its influence in 2025 ; the proofs of alignment to the Paris Agreements and actions undertaken by EDF to influence the association's climate engagement.
